Emergency Preparedness

Times of crisis create many additional challenges to the day-to-day care and safety of your residents and staff.

- Shortages of medical supplies and drugs (especially IV formulations).
- Shortages of key personnel, such as IV qualified nurses.

Medication Administration


- When faced with a shortage of injectables, tablet and capsule forms of medications can be liquefied and expediently delivered via the Macy Catheter.
- Avoid the IV route, which requires IV skilled personnel, special equipment, and time consuming placement and maintenance. Instead, rapidly administer medications rectally with the Macy Catheter.
- Clinicians can quickly give medications for relief of pain, anxiety, or respiratory distress to patients with difficulty swallowing, agitation, or delirium.

Hospi's Macy Catheter Can Help

Inserted and retained just inside the rectum with a small balloon, the Macy Catheter provides comfortable delivery of fluids and medications. It was invented by a nurse and has been successfully used in tens of thousands of clinical applications. It can be used by any licensed clinician (RN, LVN, LPN) with an MD/NP order.

Why Incorporate the Macy Catheter into Your Treatment Regimen?

Whether using the Macy Catheter for medication or fluid administration, now you can care for your residents in place avoiding discharges to area hospitals which may be capacity constrained.



Hydration

- Fluid administration via the Macy Catheter can be substituted for IV fluid administration or hypodermoclysis, avoiding needles and skilled nursing intervention.
- Use tap water – no need for special equipment or solutions.
- Any licensed healthcare staff can administer with quick training.
